

Pupil Premium Statement

The Pupil Premium is additional funding for all publically funded schools in England and Wales to support those students who are considered disadvantaged. The objective of additional support is to raise attainment of this cohort and narrow the gap between them and their peers. As The Bridge is an Independent School, only those pupils whose places are funded by the Local Authority are eligible for Pupil Premium Funding. The school works to support Pupil Premium students whose spaces are commissioned through the Local Authority. The Pupil Premium funding formula is calculated upon the number of terms each student is registered at The Bridge and based upon the yearly Pupil Premium funding of £935.00 for students in receipt of Free School Meals or classed as Forever 6 and £2300 for students who have left the care of the Local Authority as a consequence of Special Guardianship, Child Arrangements Order, Residency Order or Adoption and Children who are currently Look After. The Bridge identifies interventions and support on a student-bystudent basis, which is tailored according to each individual, with the clear objective of raising achievement levels, building resilience, addressing emotional issues, and supporting Post 16 Opportunities.

Pupil Premium Report 2021/22

For the period of 2021-22 the school had 7 students attending The Bridge whose placement was funded by the Local Authority, who were identified as Pupil Premium. Based on their starting and ending point at The Bridge and using the school's funding formula the total amount the school allocated to these students totaled £3850.00

Pupil Premium Report 2020/2021

For the period of 2020-21 the school had five students whose places were commissioned by the Local Authority and were in receipt of Free School meals or classed as Forever 6. Based upon the schools' funding formula the Pupil Premium allocation for the period totaled £4750.00.

For the period of 2019-2020 the school had four students whose places were commissioned by the Local Authority and were in receipt of Free School Meals or classed as Forever 6. Based upon the schools' funding formula the Pupil Premium Allocation for the period totaled £3120.00.
